## Fenelon Falls' Centennial Parade, 1975

KAWARTHA LAKES – This story is part of our partnership with Maryboro Lodge and was written by Glenn Walker.

In 1975 Fenelon Falls celebrated the village's centennial. It was actually the 101st anniversary, but due to sewer construction, it had been decided that it was better to wait. Organizations throughout the village coordinated activities, beginning with a "football of some style" match between the CKLY No Stars and Lloyd Kelly's Cataract Colts. The Public School demonstrated traditional handicrafts, the museum hosted a garden party, the Seniors Club had euchre, donkey baseball was played at the ball diamond, while there was a fashion show and dance at the arena. The Rotary Club put on a dinner for anyone who was born before 1900. The most anticipated event was a parade on Saturday, May 31, from the Sundial Motel (Ultramar) to the Rotary Ball Park (Russ Baptiste Park), featuring the Lindsay Kinsmen Band—who were beloved throughout the district. Imagine the ruckus it would cause today if the main street was closed for a Saturday Parade in Summer!

Fenelon Falls incorporated, separating from Fenelon Township on June 5, 1874, so it could vote a bonus to support the Victoria Railway. Railways were tremendously expensive to build, many never turned a profit, and often connected

the communities that were willing to vote a bonus. They could, however, be transformative for local economic prospects. The iron horse would make a noticeable difference to the bottom line of most businesses. However, Fenelon Township already had a railway, which ran through Lorneville along its western boundary to Coboconk, circling north and west of Balsam Lake—many ratepayers saw no reason to subsidize another railway. But it was very important to Fenelon Falls to have a railway through the village, hence the selection of a train as a village logo.

This year, Fenelon Falls is celebrating its 150th anniversary and local organizations are again hosting commemorative events. The Royal Canadian Legion is kicking off festivities with a free senior's lunch on June 4, then there is a tea and silent auction at the Senior's Centre on June 20. On June 29, the Kawartha Cycling Club will be following the old railway line to town, re-enacting a key moment in the village's founding, followed by a tea at Maryboro Lodge Museum. The library is hosting a celebration on July 17, followed by a barbeque at St. Aloysius Catholic Church on July 21. Immanuel Baptist Church has an open house on July 30. The Fenelon Falls Horticultural Society will be hosting a Garden Party at the Museum on August 26. Doors Open will be visiting Fenelon Falls on September 15, followed by a commemorative performance, You Must Remember This? by Barbara Dunn Prosser later in the fall. ## Kirk Robertson Assumes Role Of Chief Designate As Former Chief Mark Mitchell Attends Last Board Meeting

KAWARTHA LAKES - "There cannot be two Chiefs," said Mark Mitchell as he handed over the reins of Kawartha Lakes Police Service to Chief Designate Kirk Robertson.

Mitchell announced his intention to retire back in October 2022. The ceremonial change in command will not take place until August but as of Thursday Robertson has command and control of the police service.

Then Inspector Mitchell took over from Chief John Hagarty in 2018. It was the first time in approximately 60 years a new chief had been hired from within the ranks. Mitchell began his career in policing in Peel in 1988 and joined KLPS in 1990. In 2009 he took a leave of absence to serve in Afghanistan with the RCMP International Peace Operations Branch helping to train Afghan soldiers. He is the recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal, the Police Exemplary Service Medal and the South-West Asia Service Medal.

"I am very pleased to be able to turn the position of Chief over to Kirk," Mitchell told the police services board on Thursday. "Thank you very sincerely, it's been an absolute pleasure and an honour to be part of this organization for the past 30-some years and today will be somewhat bittersweet for me."

Board Chair Wanda Perceival thanks Mitchell for his 38 years of service.

"We sincerely appreciate your leadership and support and when I came on this board a few years ago I was thinking I really don't know a lot about policing and you have always been there to answer questions from each one of us so I know that I can speak on behalf of everyone that we have really appreciated what you've done for us as a board and also we've appreciated your leadership within the service. You've mentored an excellent senior team and they too have been supportive of us and you have been outstanding in the community."

With that, Robertson became Chief and thanked the board for its confidence in him.

"I'm very excited to be here and I want to just take the opportunity to thank the board for putting your faith in me to take over from Chief Mitchell," said Robertson. "There's a lot of knowledge that's leaving this room after today but I feel over the last five years that I've had the opportunity to be part of the senior team and learn from everyone here and I've taken from that to be prepared for the next step."

Perceival said there had been a lot of interest in the position and they interviewed a number of candidates.

"We spent a lot of time interviewing and you certainly presented so well and so knowledgeable and we look forward to working with you as chief."

Robertson was born and raised in Lindsay and has been a member of the Kawartha Lakes Police Service for 22 years with a total of 27 years of policing.

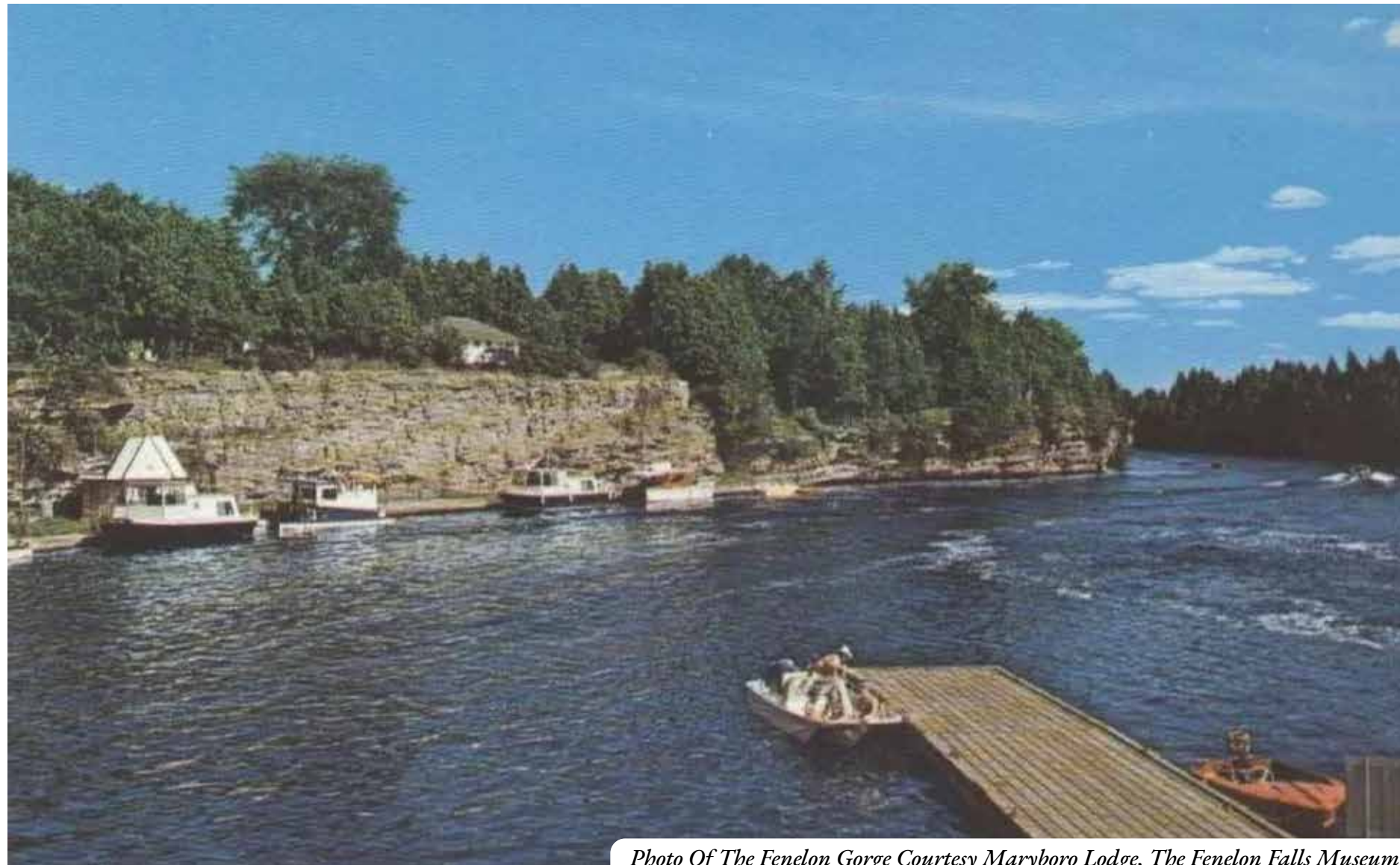

## Powerlinks Committee Outlines Vision For Lower Gorge Pedestrian Crossing In Fenelon Falls

KAWARTHA LAKES - The Fenelon Falls Powerlinks Committee recently outlined its vision for the lower gorge crossing and asked City Council for a letter of support.

The Fenelon Falls Powerlinks Committee oversees and makes recommendations to Council regarding the use of the Powerlinks Fund to be used for the betterment and enhancement of Parks and Recreation in the village of Fenelon Falls.

In 2022 Council approved the release of \$150,000 from the Fenelon Falls Powerlinks Reserve fund for a site and design study for a lower gorge crossing.

At the May 22, 2024 meeting Council was asked to provide a letter of support to the Powerlinks Committee to be used as a reference and included in any applications for regulatory approvals or grant funding as required to move the pedestrian bridge project forward.

A presentation was made in April to Council by members of the Powerlinks Committee outlining their vision for the lower gorge of the Fenelon

River, just downstream of the falls. The vision consists of two components. First, to address the inadequate dockage in the lower reach, it is proposed to install further docking at various locations along the shore of the river, with access to the top of the cliffs to access the town. Second, it is proposed that a single-span pedestrian bridge be erected to connect Clifton Street North and South, allowing a second pedestrian crossing over the river. Officials say these projects will provide a significant benefit to the community providing additional docking and walkways providing better accessibility for residents and visitors to access the downtown core.

The design phase is now complete therefore the Powerlinks Committee is requesting a letter of support for the project from Council to accompany the submission of applications to the required governing authorities seeking approval for the Powerlinks Committee to move forward with the project. Such approvals may be required from authorities such as Trent Severn Waterway (TSW), Kawartha Lakes Conservation Authority (KLCA), Department of Fisheries and Oceans, (DFO), Ministry of Transportation (MTO), and other consultation or regulatory authorities governing the project area.

Council approved the motion for a letter of support.

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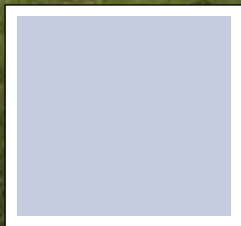
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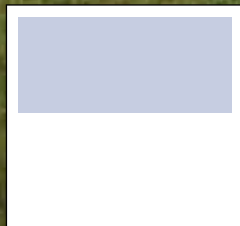
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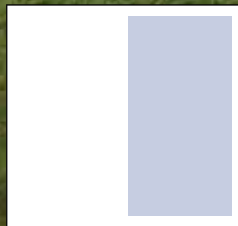
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
