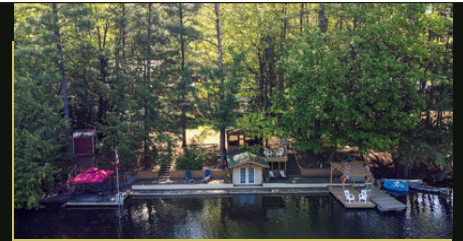

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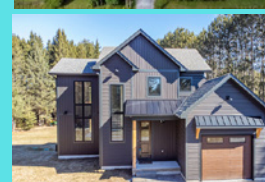
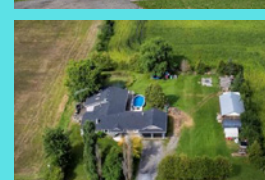

Students At LCVI Built A 15-Foot Cedar Canoe To Raise Money For Trish's Wish

KAWARTHA LAKES - "A little spark of kindness can put a colossal burst of sunshine into someone's life" is one of the mottos of the Trish's Wish Foundation. And the students at Lindsay Collegiate Vocational Institute (LCVI) have been inspired by Trish Peters to do just that.

When Trish turned 16 years old she was diagnosed with cancer. Friends describe her as a vivacious and talented girl who created such an impact on LCVI's staff and students while she was there and voted her valedictorian in her graduating year. Trish's "infectious spirit for life" and her courage and determination to beat cancer made her one of LCVI's most memorable students.

"Whenever students are asked about their most favorite day at graduation from LCVI most of them will say the Trish Peter day," teacher Joe Tamlin told Kawartha 411 news. "So even though they didn't know her I feel like they get the spirit of her and they knew working on this product the money would go to the foundation and they were pretty pumped about it."

Trish lost her life to cancer on July 30th, 2004 at 19 years of age. But her spirit has lived on through the LCVI Trish Peter Spirit Run. It began on October 14th, 2004 with students celebrating Trish's life by dressing head to toe in Trish's favourite colour: pink. With 100% participation from staff and students, they walk, jog or run a 2.5 km course through the streets of Lindsay.

Money and donations are raised by students and staff and donated to The Trish's Wish Foundation in her honour.

This year four students, Ryan Britton, Kieffer Russell, Calvin Smith and Jenna Wainalso spent countless hours building a 15-foot cedar strip ranger canoe and are selling raffle tickets to raise money for the foundation.

"Mr Shryer and I were discussing at the start of the year about how we could build something to fundraise for Trish Peter and we realized we had some students who were going to be peer tutors for my classes and they could use some of their extra time together a project and since we both had a history of building canoes we thought that would be a good project for them to whittle away at throughout the year," said Tamlin.

In a full circle moment, Mr Tamlin and Mr Shryer gained experience building canoes with Joe's father, a former teacher at LCVI. Mr Shryer built the first canoe at the school under the senior Tamlin's guiding hand.

"I knew Trish so it hits home for me for sure because I was at this school when Trish was here so that was an extra motivation for me to kind of get involved more so than I already was with the fundraising. Honestly, all of the teachers here dive in head first when it comes to this, it's one of the biggest days we have at LCVI." Tamlin told Kawartha 411 News.

Trish's Wish Foundation provides financial assistance and support to families in the City of Kawartha Lakes in a time of crisis as a result of serious illness or injury to a member of that family who is between the ages of 17 and 25.

The canoe can be viewed at the Home Building Centre on Lindsay Street South in Lindsay.

Tickets can be purchased at the LCVI office and at Home Building Centre.

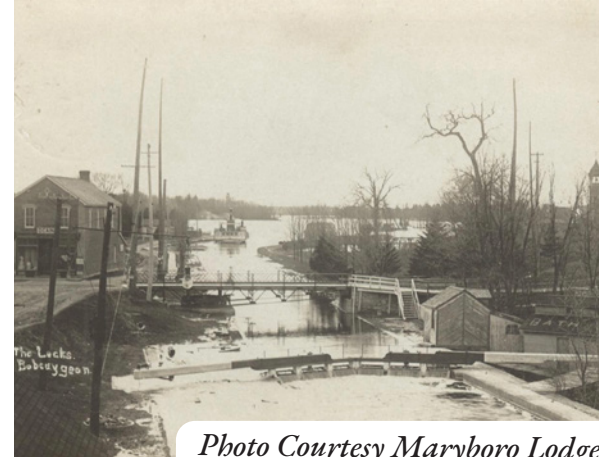
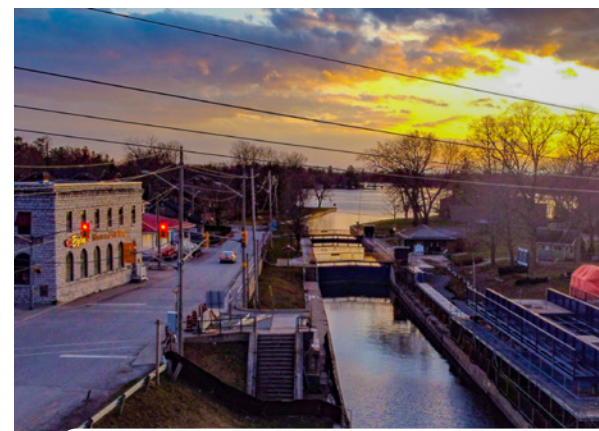

Bobcaygeon Locks In Spring

KAWARTHA LAKES - The original image, circa 1900, was taken during the spring freshet, with a water level high enough to overflow the locks. In the distance, the steamer Esturion is at the upper wharf. The Esturion was originally named the Victoria, but after an 1884 fire, the Trent Valley Navigation Company decided that the ship's charred timbers were an improvement. They rebuilt the boat with its new name and it proved to be one of their longest-serving vessels. It ran passenger and freight service from Lindsay to Bobcaygeon, stopping at Sturgeon Point. On the left in the original picture is Dan Cain's store, which burned in the 1913 fire. The fire hall appears on the right. Birdhouse Realty Legacy Fund Donates \$16,200 To Local Charities

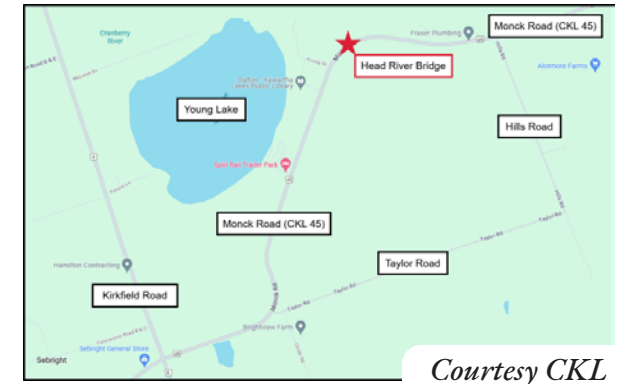
KAWARTHA LAKES - Every home sold through Lindsay's Birdhouse Realty is helping local charities.

Head River Bridge On Monck Road Rehabilitation To Start April 29, 2024

KAWARTHA LAKES-The City of Kawartha Lakes says it has retained Beton Inc. to undertake the rehabilitation of the Head River Bridge located on Monck Road (CKL Road 45) over the Head River. DM Wills Associates Limited will be assisting the municipality with oversight of the project.

Project Scope:

- Patching, waterproofing, and paving the existing concrete deck
- Removing the existing barrier walls on deck and reconstructing them with new code compliant concrete barrier walls
- Removal and reconstruction of concrete approach slabs
- Concrete patch repairs to the bridge structure itself
- Removal and replacement of concrete curb and gutters on both approaches
- Asphalt paving of the structure and approaches
- Guide rail improvements on the approaches; including removal of existing systems and installation of a new steel beam guide rail

The construction work is anticipated to start April 29, 2024. Traffic will be reduced to one lane with automated traffic signals for the duration of the rehabilitation. Short traffic stoppages may be required and should be expected during the project.

Please note that one open lane over the bridge will only be 3.35m wide, which is too narrow for large trucks. Large trucks are asked to follow the detour; advanced warning signs will be placed prior to the start of the bridge work. Normal pick-up trucks, SUVs and cars will not need to use the detour.

Construction is anticipated to be completed by August 5, 2024.

“It’s always been something that I’ve been pretty curious about. I guess growing up in a pretty urban area its something that I never really had exposure to but I do think there are really unique charms to it and considering the situation here I think that’s something I would want to consider,” she told Kawartha 411 News.

Fellow student Eileen Tang said the day opened her eyes to the possibilities when working in a smaller community.

“I haven’t really thought about it but I do like how much exposure you get up here and just how much you help out my being here versus just being another learner in Toronto where there’s a million other people who can do what you do. Even if it’s a month you help a lot of people, there’s a lot of need that you are able to fill.” said Tang.

With a critical shortage of doctors locally and across the province, the Kawartha Lakes Health Care Initiative (KLHCI) hosted the one-day event hoping it would encourage students such as Leung and Tang to consider a future practice in CKL.

“KLHCI cannot coordinate an event such as this without strong support from the leadership and staff of the Ross Memorial Hospital, and the physicians who take part in the workshops and panel. We would like to thank Dr. Dawn Reid, Dr. Naomi Nicholson, Dr. Stuart Bothwell, Dr. Sara-Lynn Francis and Dr. Bruno Helt, along with Leanne Harding, RN for volunteering their expertise and passion for the day. Further thanks are extended to KLHCI board members and CKL community members who volunteered their time to guide the students throughout the day. Final thanks go to the Pie-Eyed Monk for providing a wonderful lunch,” says Andrew Veale, KLHCI President.

“On behalf of the medical students, we wish to express our appreciation to the University of Toronto Faculty Medical Society for the grant received to provide transportation and accommodations for the Rural Medicine Community Experience Day. Local Health Care Initiative Hosts Medical Students In Hopes Of Enticing Them To Work In Kawartha Lakes

KAWARTHA LAKES - 42 University of Toronto medical students spent the day in Lindsay on Wednesday learning about the importance and the charm of rural medicine.

In the morning the first-and-second year medical students participated in a hands-on workshop in suturing, along with sessions regarding wound care and dermatology. The students also engaged in a question-and-answer session at the Pie Eyed Monk with a panel of local family physicians regarding living and working in the City of Kawartha Lakes in the afternoon. The panel consisted of Dr. Helt, Dr. Francis and Dr. Bothwell who have a combined 68 years of medical experience. The talked about the benefits of rural medicine, calling it the best of both worlds.

“The work is different, there’s the opportunity to see a lot of different things and you are forced to deal with them The experience and skills learned are amazing.” said Dr Francis. All three talked about how much they enjoyed the camaraderie between the doctors. Dr Helt told the students his daughter would babysit for Dr Bothwell.

Canada Crayon Company In Lindsay

KAWARTHA LAKES - In 1933, this Edwardian factory building on the east bank of the Scugog River, which had housed the Boving Company in the 1910s, was repurposed as the Canada Crayon Company. Later renamed Crayola Canada, after a merger with the world famous American company, crayons and chalk were made at this site until 1965. After Crayola moved to Mary Street, the site was taken over by the Shaft Machines Company.

The building sat empty for a number of years before being demolished around 2000. The railway tracks in the foreground originally led to lumber yards on land that was later redeveloped into present-day Rivera Park. Today, only a pair of white brick gate posts marking the Canada Crayon Company’s main entrance survive.
